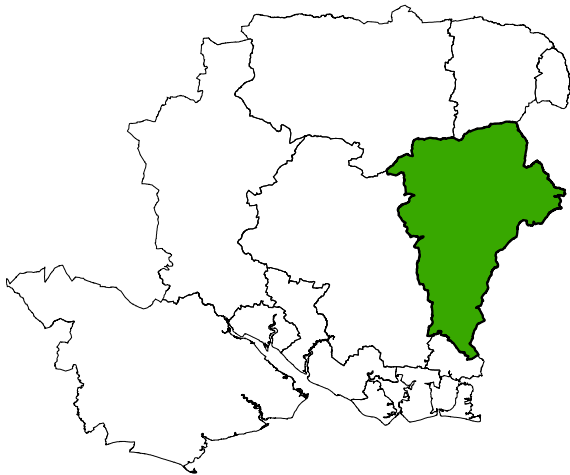
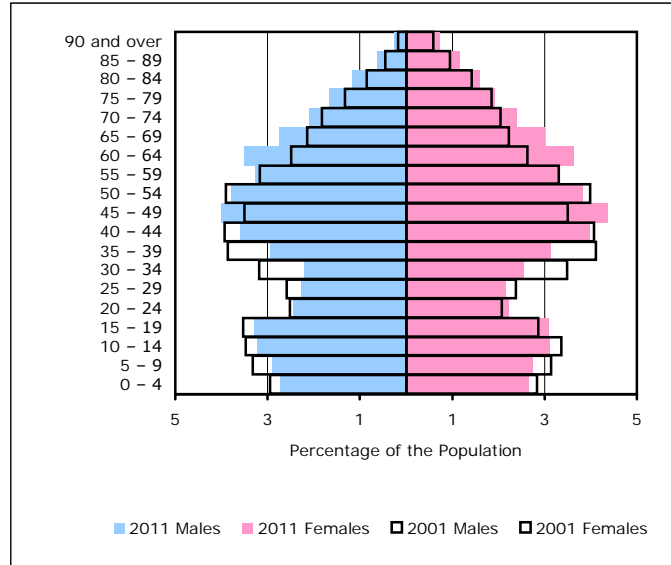


2011 Census Headline Facts and Figures East Hampshire

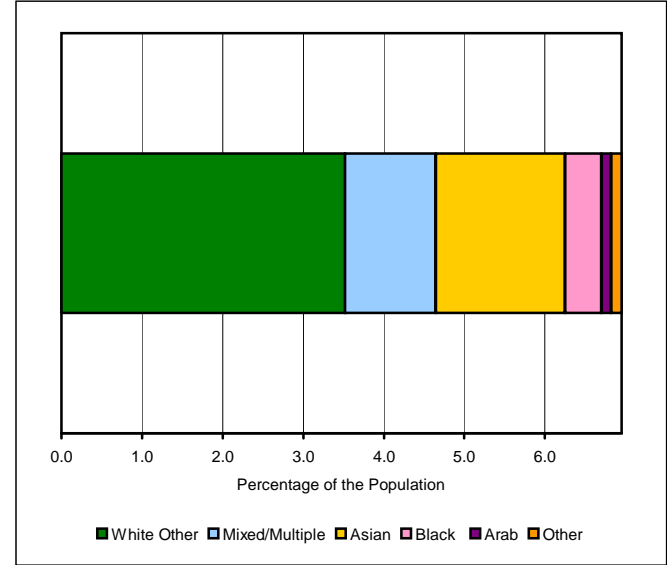


Age Profile



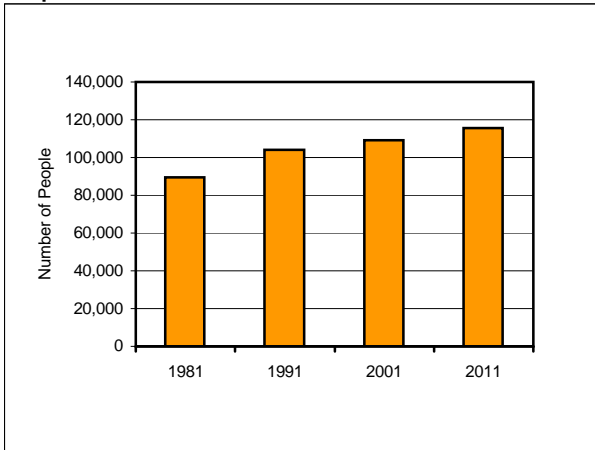
Between 2001 and 2011 there has been a decline in the percentage of the working age population from 63.7% to 62.0%. There has been a particularly large decline amongst young adults aged 25-39 (from 19.6% to 15.2%).

Ethnicity



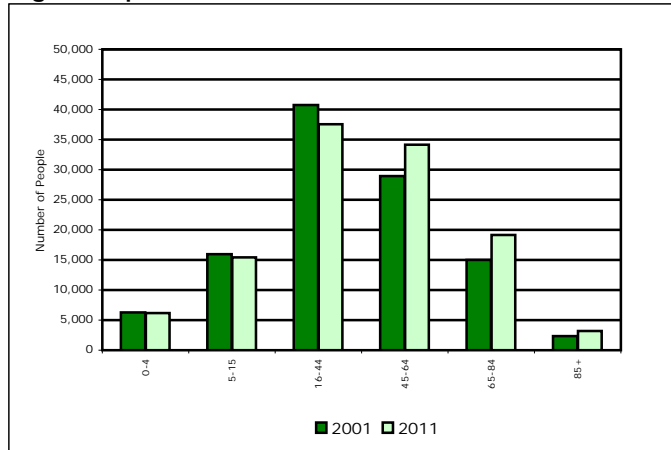
93.0% of East Hampshire's resident population are of ethnic group 'White British'¹, those in other ethnic groups increased from 4.3% to 7.0% over the period.

Population



The 2011 Census population of East Hampshire is 115,600. The population has increased by 6,300 since 2001, approximately 5.8%.

Age Groups



Most growth since 2001 has been in the oldest age groups, the 65 and over's increased by 28.8%. There was also a small decrease in children aged 0-4 years (1.7%).

Dependency Ratios²

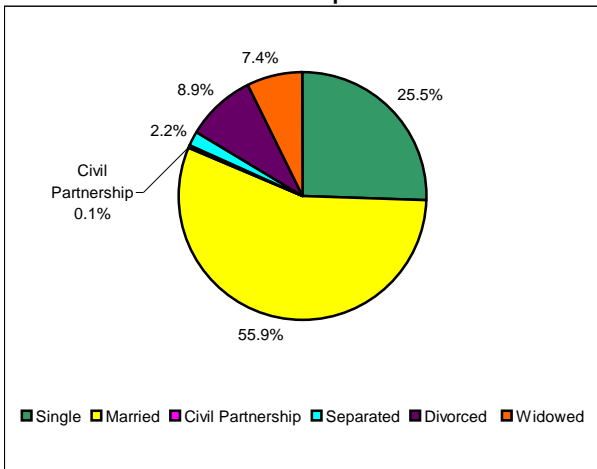

Total Dependency has risen due to the increasing numbers of older people, whilst child dependency has declined.

Population Density

There are 2.2 people per hectare living in East Hampshire. This is below both the South East and England and Wales population densities of 4.5 and 3.7 respectively.

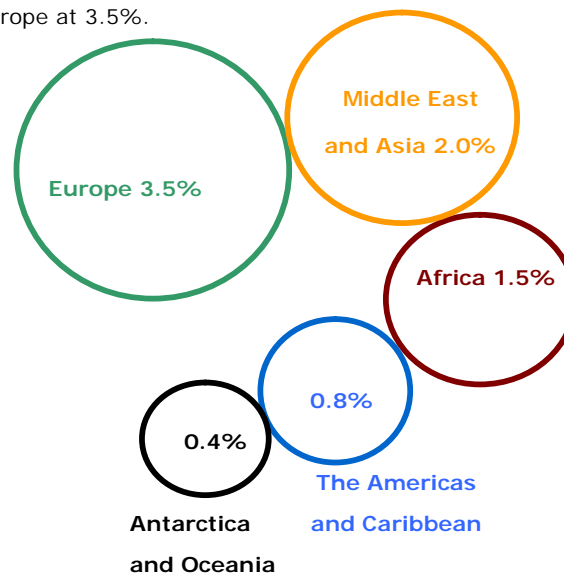
Marital and Civil Partnership Status



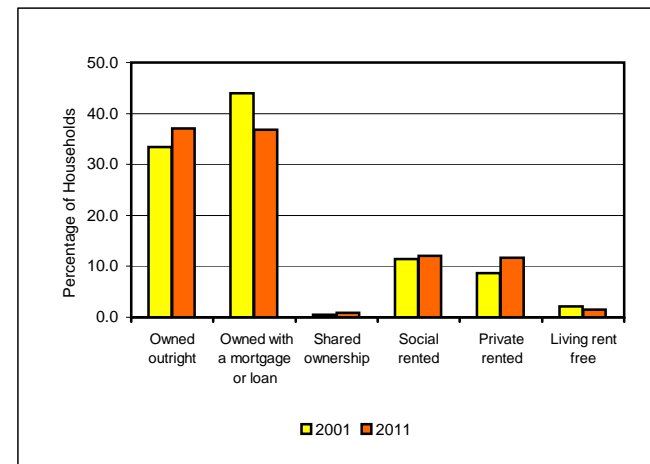
55.9% of the adult³ population are married, a decline from 58.7% in 2001. Those that are single (never married) account for 25.5%, an increase from 23.9% in 2001.

Country of Birth

91.7% of East Hampshire's population were born in the UK, a reduction from 93.5% in 2001. The next biggest region is Europe at 3.5%.



Tenure



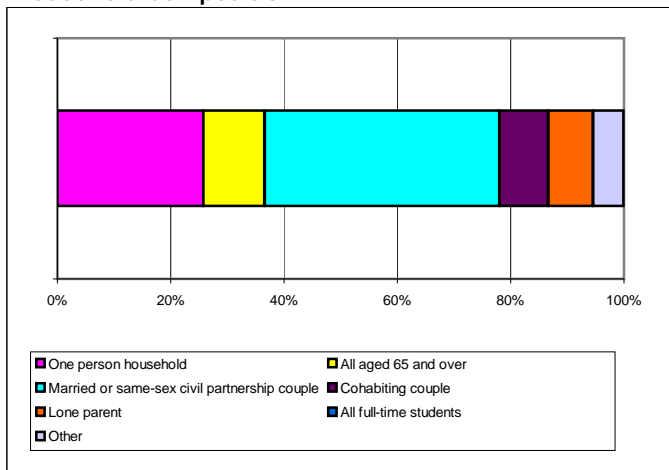
Between 2001 and 2011 the percentage of rented households increased, alongside shared and outright ownership. The percentage of households owned with a mortgage or a loan decreased by 16.2% over the period.

Religion

Christianity remains the largest religion in East Hampshire at 64.7% however it has experienced a large decline since 2001. The percentage with no religion has increased by 71.1%.

Household Composition



Households comprised of married or civil partners account for 41.5%. One person households account for 25.8%, of which half (50%) are occupied by those aged 65 and over.

¹White British includes those describing their ethnicity as English, Welsh, Scottish, Northern Irish or British.

²The Total Dependency Ratio is the number of children (aged 0-15) and retired people (aged 65 and over) to every 100 people of working age. The Child Ratio is the number of children and retired people to every 100 people of working age.

The Old Age Ratio is the number of retired people per 100 of working age.

³Marital and Civil Partnership status refers to the population aged 16 and over.
