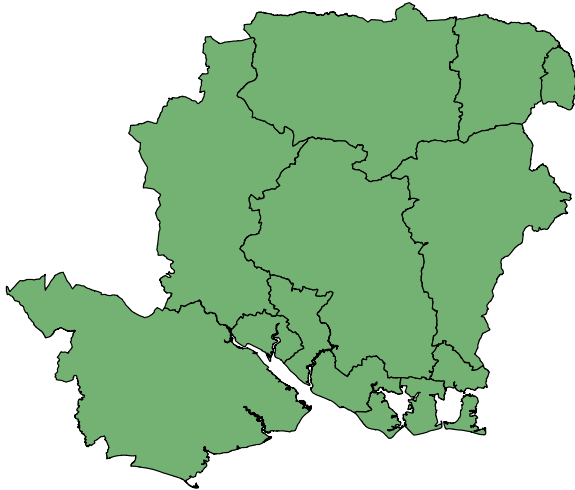
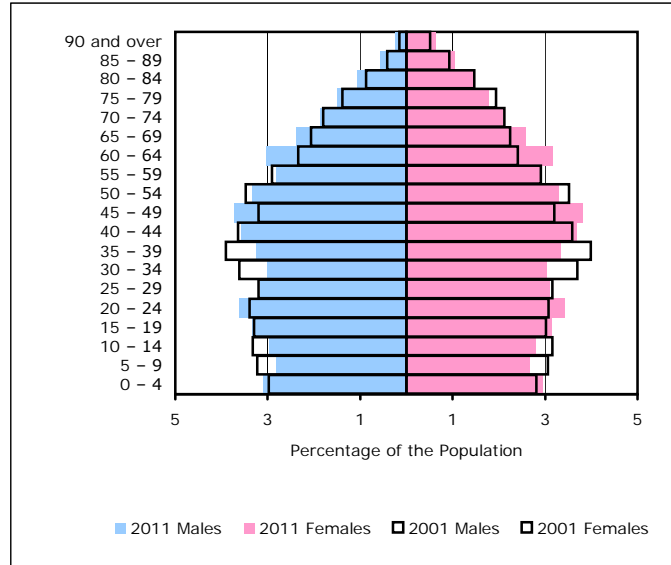

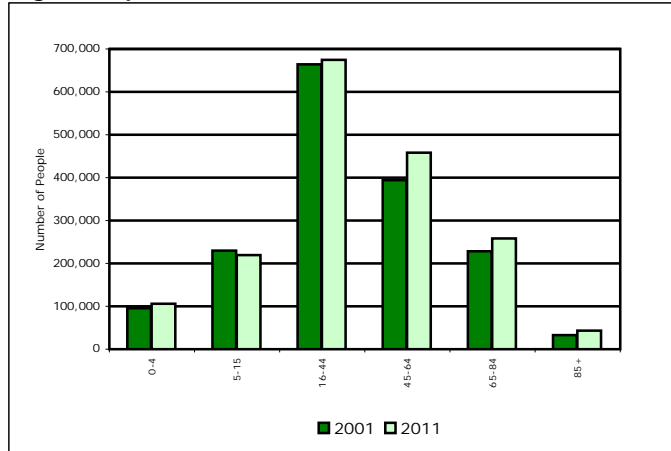


Age Profile



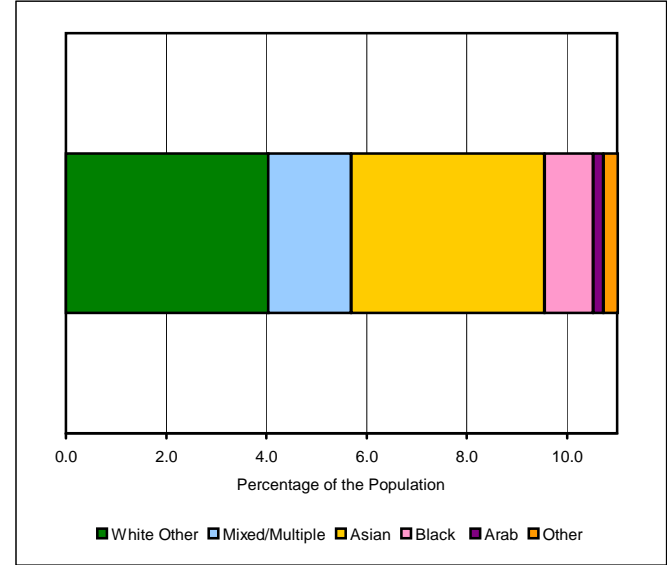
Between 2001 and 2011 the working age population has remained stable at 64%. However there has been a large decline amongst young adults aged 25-39 (from 21.6% to 18.9%).

Age Groups



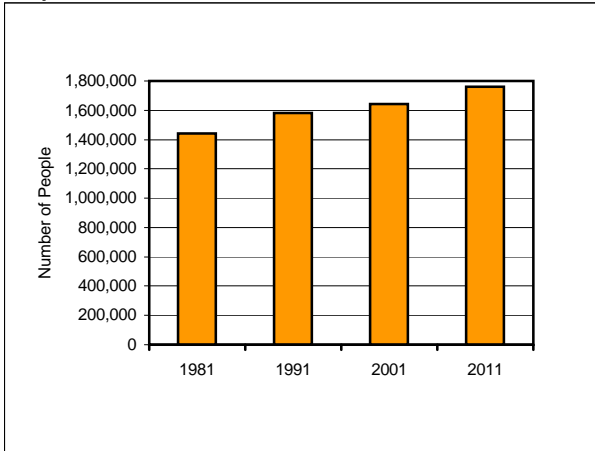
Most growth since 2001 has been in the oldest age groups, the 65 and over's increased by 15.3%. There was also an increase in children aged 0-4 years (11.6%).

Ethnicity



89.0% of Hampshire's resident population are estimated to be of ethnic group 'White British'¹, those in other ethnic groups increased from 5.9% to 11.0% over the period.

Population



The 2011 Census population of Hampshire is 1,759,700. The population has increased by 115,500 since 2001, approximately 7.0%.

Dependency Ratios²

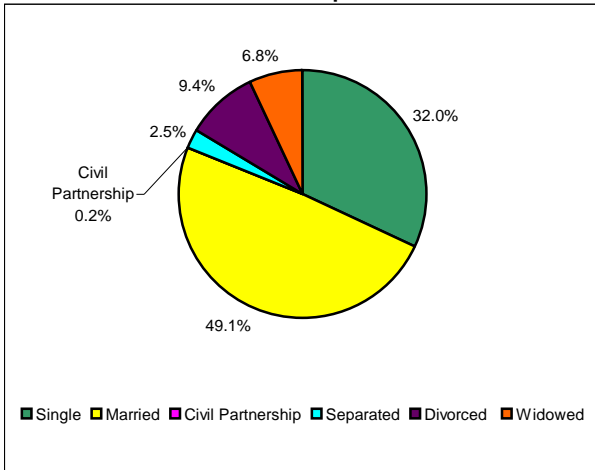

Total Dependency has remained stable, whilst child dependency has declined.

Population Density

There are 4.7 people per hectare living in Hampshire. This is above both the South East and England and Wales population densities of 4.5 and 3.7 respectively.

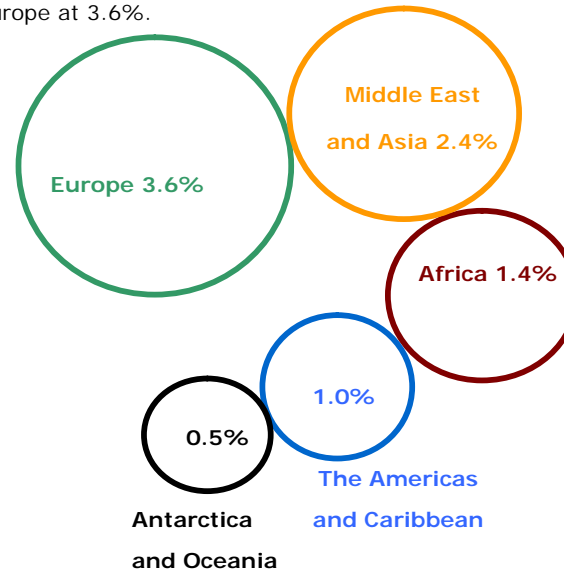
Marital and Civil Partnership Status



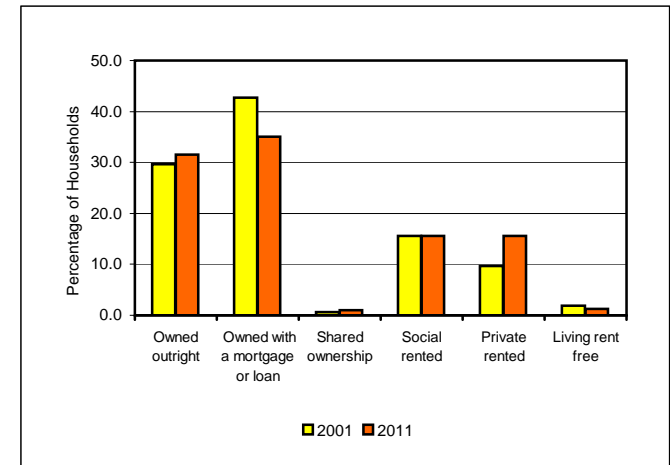
49.1% of the adult³ population are married, a decline from 52.8% in 2001. Those that are single (never married) account for 32.0%, an increase from 28.5% in 2001.

Country of Birth

90.0% of Hampshire's population were born in the UK, a reduction from 93.6% in 2001. The next biggest region is Europe at 3.6%.



Tenure



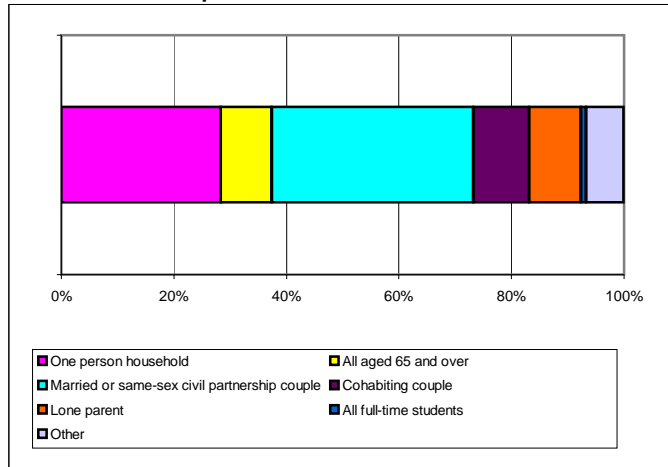
Between 2001 and 2011 the percentage of rented households increased, alongside shared and outright ownership. The percentage of households owned with a mortgage or a loan decreased by 17.9% over the period.

Christianity remains the largest religion in Hampshire at 59.7% however it has experienced a large decline since 2001. The percentage with no religion has increased by 74.7%.

Household Composition



Households comprised of married or civil partners account for 35.8%. One person households account for 28.3%, of which 43.9% are occupied by those aged 65 and over.

¹White British includes those describing their ethnicity as English, Welsh, Scottish, Northern Irish or British.

²The Total Dependency Ratio is the number of children (aged 0-15) and retired people (aged 65 and over) to every 100 people of working age. The Child Ratio is the number of children and retired people to every 100 people of working age.

The Old Age Ratio is the number of retired people per 100 of working age.

³Marital and Civil Partnership status refers to the population aged 16 and over.
